The Central of Georgia Railway Company operates over 1763.90 miles of railroad in Georgia, Tennessee and Alabama and with its through connections serves all the important recreational, business, agricultural and industrial regions of the Midwest, South and Southeast.

TABLE OF CONTENTS AND INDEX TO STATIONS on page 3 will assist you in locating service to and from stations in this folder.

The time tables show the time at which trains may be expected to arrive and depart from stations and to connect with other trains, but departure or arrival or connection at time stated is not guaranteed. This Company reserves the right to vary from the time shown in this folder without notice.

Ticket Offices are open a sufficient time before the departure of trains to permit the purchase of tickets, and passengers are requested to do so before boarding the train; however some small station offices are closed on Saturday, Sunday and holidays and tickets should be purchased in advance at such points.

Standard Time is used throughout this folder, Central Time or Eastern Time as shown.

A.M. or P.M. . . . Time from 12.01 midnight to 12.00 noon is shown in light faced figures and time from 12.01 noon to and including 12.00 midnight in heavy faced figures.

Train Stops: Trains make regular stops at stations where time figures only are shown. When a symbol or letter appears in train column opposite station this indicates train only stops on certain conditions.

Redemption of Tickets: Tickets unused, or partly used will be redeemed under tariff regulations at proper value. Apply to Ticket Agent or mail direct to Director, Revenue Accounting, (Passenger Division), Atlanta, Ga. 30303.

Children under five years of age are carried free, when accompanied by parent or guardian; five years and under twelve, one half fare; twelve years of age or over, full fare.

BAGGAGE

Defined—Baggage consisting of wearing apparel, toilet articles, (except liquids) and personal effects in actual use, necessary and appropriate for the comfort and convenience of the passenger's journey, and not intended for other persons or sale, may be

checked in baggage service. Money, jewelry, silverware, negotiable papers and like valuables, liquids, fragile or perishable articles, radios and household goods, must not be included when checking baggage, nor are the carriers responsible in that event.

Marking for Identification—Mark or tag the outside of each piece of baggage with your name and address, also place the same information inside, whether the baggage is checked or carried with you on the train.

Forwarding—Every effort will be made to facilitate the handling of baggage, but this company does not guarantee to forward on same train with passengers, or within a specific time limit, reserving the right to handle on a preceding or following train.

Storage is charged when baggage is held at railroad stations longer than the free time limit.

Baggage Service Charge of 25c applies for each piece of hand baggage, also articles classified as such, and 50c for each piece of other than hand baggage, checked for interstate movement. Service charge collection is made at time baggage is checked, subject to tariff stipulation as to classification and exceptions.

Checking Allowance, Valuation and Liability—150 pounds of baggage, not exceeding \$100.00 in value, may be checked without additional charge on each adult ticket, and 75 pounds, not exceeding \$50.00 in value, on each half-fare ticket. A charge is made for weight over allowance per ticket. Passengers have the privilege of declaring excess value at a nominal charge of 25c for each additional \$100.00, or fraction thereof, subject to total valuation of \$2,500.00. No single piece of baggage exceeding 300 pounds in weight, or 72 inches in greatest dimension, will be checked.

MISCELLANEOUS

Dogs, Cats and Small Household Pets—other than leashed and muzzled guide or leader dog accompanying a blind person—will not be handled in coaches over Central of Georgia Railway, but are transported in baggage cars, subject to tariff regulations. Not more than two dogs, cats or animals, deemed quiet, safe, harmless, inoffensive and otherwise unobjectionable, when leashed and muzzled or carried in suitable container, may be taken into Pullman room accommodations, subject to established regulations.

Lost Articles to be inquired for at offices of Division Superintendents, Macon and Columbus, and at office of Superintendent Terminal Station, Atlanta.

No responsibility is assumed for unchecked articles left in stations or cars.

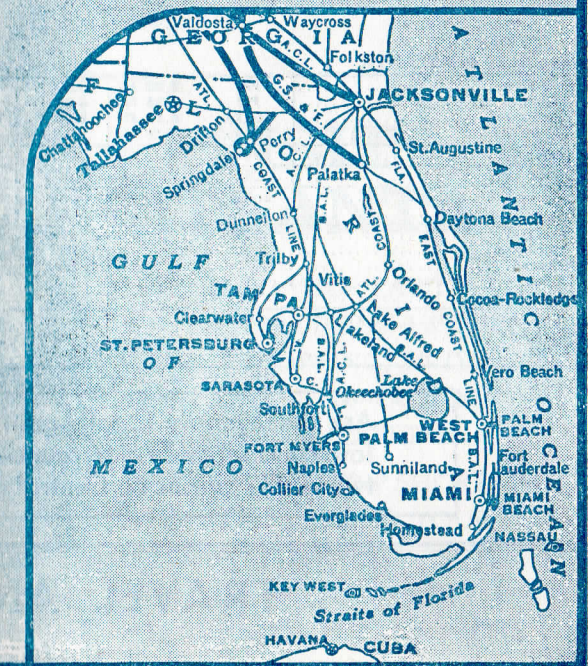
